doors opened to a wide terrace overlooking a fountain featuring a bronze figure of Neptune.

The grounds, which encompass more than 180 acres of lakes, woods and gardens, were designed by André Le Nôtre, the mastermind behind the intricate gardens at Versailles. The château has been dubbed "le petite Versailles," because in addition to Le Nôtre's contribution, the home itself was constructed by a leading architect of King Louis XIV, Jules Hardouin-Mansart, who designed Versailles' famous Hall of Mirrors, the Queen's Staircase and Le Grand Trianon.

At first, it all feels too precious. I carefully wipe my shoes, skirt the carpets and keep my hands dutifully in my pockets, though I long to stroke the old stones. But as Deubel shows us around, from the 15th-century foundations below (complete with an "oubliette," or dungeon, which could come in handy for guests who skip out on their bill) to the sunlit dining room, the wood-paneled library and music room, we find that Château de Villette feels more like a home than a palace.

"Versailles is monumental in size. It was built to impress," notes Deubel. "But here, you have human dimensions. You feel comfortable."

Sure, the music room is furnished with silk-upholstered chairs and glittering fixtures that wouldn't have looked out of place two centuries ago, but a pair of flashy red maracas resting on a marble-top table and a songbook by the Beatles splayed atop the grand piano engender visions of boisterous sing-alongs. And in the salon where Sophie de Grouchy, an 18th-century beauty and one-time lover of Lafayette, entertained the greatest minds of her day, there are two comfortable sofas, a basket of fashion magazines and piles of books laden with sticky notes marking the pages where the famous château has earned a bit of ink.



Perhaps it's the normalcy of vegging in front of the television, but within hours of our arrival, we've gone from our "look, don't touch" mentality to foraging for a snack in one of the château's three kitchens. It's an intimate little hub, sandwiched between the dining room and the library, furnished with ancient brown appliances and a long slab of a country table. Not fancy, but delightfully cozy and warm.

Decker is quite happy for her guests to make themselves at home. When she sweeps in a few hours later, casually tossing her purse on the stone table in the rotunda and kicking off her sandals beneath a sideboard in the dining room, she includes me in the dinner preparations. I set the table with gold chargers and her Versailles china (no more paper wrappers for us!) and light candles in the crystal candelabras.

Guests can hire a full complement of chefs, maids and butlers. But tonight, Decker, who teaches French, Italian and Chinese cooking classes at the château, whips up dinner herself. We linger for

hours at the table, savoring prosciutto-wrapped melon, ginger-and-garlic beef stir-fry and Decker's mouth-watering chocolate mousse as she explains what led her to purchase the château in 1999 after visiting more than 30 properties around France.

Decker already owned the Château de Grimaldi in Aixen-Provence, but she was looking for another one closer to Paris. "I wanted something light, bright and happy — no dark narrow staircases and hallways. And I didn't want a moat," she adds decisively, "which would breed mosqui-

toes in the summertime."

She spent three years restoring and furnishing the château, searching for period pieces and reproductions that befit the surroundings without making it feel stuffy. "It's elegant and beautiful, but I don't want you to feel like you're in a museum and can't put your feet up," she insists.

As the candles wax low and the feast dwindles in the wee hours of the morning, my husband and I climb the stone staircase to the second floor, where a long gallery gives way to bedrooms on either side. "Choose any one you want," Decker says. So I make a beeline for a spacious boudoir overlooking the moonlit gardens below.

Tomorrow, my husband (Prince Charming) and I will return to Paris in our taxi, which I can't help but believe will turn into a pumpkin as we leave the gates. But tonight, slipping between the sheets of the vast bed with its gilded headboard, I feel like a princess, minus the pea beneath my comfy mattress. OK, so I'm mixing my fairy tale metaphors, but as guests here inevitably discover, Château de Villette is the realization of all those childhood fantasies rendered in silk tapestries and stone.



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
